## ALL MESSAGES TAKEN BY THIS COMPANY ARE SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING TERMS:

To guard against mistakes or delays, the sender of a message should order it repeated, that is, telegraphed back to the originating office for comparison. For this, one-half the unreported message rate is charged in addition. 
Dear Mr. Doherty:

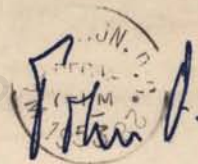


Thank you for your views concerning an increase in Social Security benefits.

As you know, the House recently passed and sent to the Senate the Social Security Amendments Bill of 1965. This bill contains a provision which provides an across-the-board 7% increase in Social Security benefits, retroactive to January 1. The Senate Finance Committee has held hearings on the measure and expects to consider it in executive session this month.

I am aware of the financial burdens many of our elderly encounter upon retirement and feel that a constructive benefit increase is overdue. I do, therefore, hope that such an increase will be approved this session.

I appreciate hearing from you on this important matter, and am enclosing a press release which describes the basic features of the Social Security legislation I introduced this year.

SALTONSTALL URGES COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH CARE PROGRAM THIS YEAR

Senator Leverett Saltonstall (R., Mass.) told the Senate Finance Committee today as the lead-off witness, that Congress must meet the "clear need that exists for additional health care for the older citizens who lack the means to provide it" by enacting a comprehensive health care program this year. The Massachusetts lawmaker has been in the vanguard of Senate advocates of major medicare legislation. In 1960 he introduced the Eisenhower Administration's bill, and he has introduced bills on the subject in every Congress since.

In discussing the bill he is sponsoring this year, Saltonstall said, "My bill, which is also sponsored by five other Senators, is a voluntary, State-administered health insurance program for persons 65 or older with low or moderate incomes, and offers a choice of three options: (1) a short term diagnostic plan; (2) a long term catastrophic illness plan; and (3) a private insurance policy program under which payment would be made toward defraying the cost of a qualified health insurance policy. It would be financed from general revenues--not a compulsory payroll tax."

Saltonstall said he believed his approach remained preferable to that of the Administration even though that bill had been modified substantially and the benefits broadened. He expressed approval of the improvement and extension of Kerr-Mills provided in the House-passed bill, and the fact that the supplementary package of benefits was voluntary and financed from general revenues. "In fact," said Saltonstall, "the health care part of the bill could be strengthened further if all of it, rather than just part of it, were based on the voluntary, general revenue, State-administered features of my own bill."

The Bay State Senator noted that to date the payroll tax had only been used to provide cash benefits for retirees, and said he feared that using it



to provide services such as hospitalization might prevent Congress from later being able to keep cash benefits in line with cost-of-living increases. Saltonstall cited Wilbur Mills, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee in support of his statement that "there is general agreement that there is a limit to the amount which can be collected by payroll tax," and "cash benefits might be compromised by the health benefits since health expenses are rising considerably faster."

Saltonstall also criticized the payroll tax as a regressive one under which a person earning \$5,600 would have to contribute as much as a person earning \$56,000, whereas under general revenue financing people would contribute according to their income level. He therefore urged the Committee to substitute his own medicare bill for the health care section of the House-passed bill.

Massachusetts' senior Senator expressed support for other important features of the social security bill, such as the 7% increase in cash benefits for social security recipients, the increase in the earnings limitation for retirees, the provision enabling children to receive benefits to age 22 when enrolled full time in school, and the reduction of the waiting period required before disability payments begin.

SALTONSTALL SUPPORTS SOCIAL SECURITY AND MEDICARE BILL

WASHINGTON, July 9--Senator Leverett Saltonstall (R., Mass.) told the Senate today that H. R. 6675, the Social Security and Medicare Bill, "represents an important and necessary step forward with respect to many programs which are so important to millions of Americans."

Saltonstall, who since 1960 has been in the forefront of efforts to provide medicare for individuals 65 and over who need it, said that while he still believes his approach to the problem is preferable to that included in this bill, he could count votes and saw that this was the only kind of health insurance and medical care for the aged provision which had a chance of passing.

While I personally believe that a voluntary program financed from general revenues and reaching those elderly people who need help in meeting medical expenses is preferable to the medicare program before us today--one which is compulsory, financed by a payroll tax which falls heaviest on people of lower income, and available to all citizens over 65 whether or not they are fully able to meet their own medical expenses-- I do believe that the time has come when we must enact legislation which will go beyond the group assisted by the Kerr-Mills Act and which will avoid some of the burdensome means test requirements which have been established in some states under the Act..Millions of Americans over 65 need help now in meeting their medical expenses, and I believe we must provide that help."

The senior Bay State Republican said the Administration's proposal had been significantly improved over previous versions.

The voluntary supplementary feature, which has been added to the Administration's bill, provides medical services, including physicians' and surgical services, which are essential to any meaningful program and which were important features of my own bills....The Senate also accepted my amendment removing the requirement that to receive home health care under the basic program, our older citizens must first be hospitalized for 3 consecutive days...I regret no provision was made for prescribed drugs outside the hospital since such drugs comprise about 26% of an aged person's annual medical expenses. But I am glad the amendment offered by myself and Senator Javits was adopted directing H.E.W. to report to Congress on the advisability of including these drugs in the program.

In his speech, Saltonstall lauded other important features of the measure such as the 7% across-the-board increase in Social Security benefits retroactive to January for the 20 million Social Security beneficiaries. He said these benefits had not kept pace with the rise in the cost of living and that an increase was long overdue. He also expressed satisfaction that the bill included a provision raising the earnings limitation for Social Security recipients to \$1,800, which was similar to a bill he had introduced.

The Massachusetts lawmaker said that H.R. 6675 demonstrated the concern of Congress in improving the daily lives of both young and old.

It increases Social Security benefits for our retired workers, an action which is long overdue. It improves and expands public assistance programs for the needy aged, blind, disabled, and families with dependent children. It expands services for maternal and child health, crippled children, child welfare and the mentally retarded, and establishes special project grants to provide comprehensive health care and services for needy children of school age or preschool age.


